- Draw a rainbow and plan different types of activities for each colour for example home learning, outside activities, board game, helping others, calm and happy.

This week's activities you might want to try

#### **Skills Builders activities**

- Transport ideas and activities across the curriculum for primary and lower secondary (although could be extended depending on the needs of your child) this transport themed resource provides a range of activities spanning a number of skill areas. It would be useful to pick and choose ideas which may particularly appeal to a child or which could be used as activities with more than one child. There is no expectation that it should be followed slavishly, it should be enjoyed! Weblink
- Travel and geography themed games whole range of geography themed games. Some more suitable for younger children, while others would appeal to older children. A vast array to choose from. Weblink
- Best apps for kids: maps and atlases only one of these apps has to be paid for, all the others are free. Google Earth a great way to travel virtually. Children can find their home or follow their route to school or travel the world! Tiny Countries is game-based, helping Tiny the Chick to save the world. In the course of the game it introduces cities, countries and continents and it's fun! Geobee Challenge by National Geographic and GEO WALK HD 3D Fact Book are more challenging and are aimed at older children. All are very visual. Weblink
- National Geographic kids activities to do at home including making Arctic art, making a polar bear cake, making a herb garden, a space mobile, a treasure hunt and places to encourage animals such as a bee hotel. <u>Weblink</u>
- Virtual visits make a virtual journey to a museum or gallery for example <u>35 Virtual Field Trips</u>.
- STEM learning are providing remote science lessons for all key stages from key stage 1 to key stage 5. Weblink

#### **Be Creative**

- Sailing boat birthdays display board make and decorate 12 sailing boats each labelled for a month of the year. Children then add the names of family and friends to the correct month depending on their date of birth. Ships can be decorated extravagantly, e.g. the boat for November could have a fireworks theme, December a Christmas theme. Use your imagination! <u>Weblink</u>
- Snakes and Ladders an all-time favourite, Snakes and Ladders board game is, loosely speaking, a journey during which children encounter hazards (the snakes) and good fortune (the ladders). It is simple, fun, interactive, good for turn-taking, social skills, resilience and counting skills. Design your own board and game based around the local area or a favourite family journey / holiday.
